“I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me, and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them.” Judas (not Iscariot) said to him, “Lord, how is it that you will reveal yourself to us and not to the world?” Jesus answered him, “Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them. Whoever does not love me does not keep my words, and the word that you hear is not mine but is from the Father who sent me.

Suquamish Name Translation

The name dxWsaqwab or "Suquamish" is believed to translate to "people of the clear salt water" or "people of the driftwood" in Lushootseed, the traditional language of the Suquamish. Understanding the meaning of their name provides insights into their deep connection with the natural elements of their ancestral land. Explore the linguistic and cultural nuances through language resources and discussions with Suquamish community members.

Suquamish Traditional Economy

The Suquamish People historically thrived through a harmonious relationship with their environment. Depending on the abundant resources of the region, they engaged in fishing, hunting, and gathering. The waters surrounding their ancestral land provided a bountiful source of sustenance, and the land offered materials for crafting essential tools and shelter.
